

About Har Hazeitim

ar Hazeitim is also known as Har Hazeisim (Ashkenazic pronunciation) or the Mt. of Olives. It is a mountain ridge in eastern Jerusalem and is the oldest surviving Jewish cemetery in the world, dating back over 3,000 years. It is the resting place for more than 150,000 Jews.

The kedusha of Har Hazeitim dates back to the Bet Hamikdash when Har Hazeitim served its twin mountain, the Har Habayit. Jews have been buried on Har Hazeitim since Biblical times, which houses the tombs of the most prominent Jewish citizens of antiquity through modern day.

The Problem — A History of Neglect and Abuse

In May 2010, State Controller Micha Lindenstrauss issued a stinging report on the neglect and abuse of the neglect and abuse of Judaism's holiest site. He blamed successive Israeli governments for neglecting the cemetery.

A SAD STATE:

- The cemetery remained largely neglected;
- It became the dumping grounds for contractors, a highway for residents, a passageway for donkeys, a soccer field for Arab youths, a major marketplace for drugs and contraband, and a path for Arab school children to and from school.
- The virtual neglect of Har Hazeitim emboldened the local Arab population to use it as an extension of their neighboring villages;
- Vandals routinely desecrated graves and defiled tombstones;
- Mourners and worshippers and Jewish vehicles were frequently stoned;
- Laws and penalties concerning cemetery vandalism and rock throwing have largely gone unenforced;
- Har Hazeitim is not fully fenced in to ward off vandals;
- Proper flood lighting and other needed services such as amenity stations and adequate shaded areas for visitors and mourners are sorely needed.


The International Committee for the Preservation of Har Hazeitim (ICPHH)

In 2010, the International Committee of the Preservation of Har Hazeitim (ICPHH) was established by a cross section of lay leaders and headsof organizations.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- The construction of 20,000 tombstones over destroyed graves;
- 172 cameras were installed in addition to a 24/7 Command Center (more are needed on the approaching roads);
- A police substation was established in March 2012.
- A series of new fences were installed. More are needed;
- The ICPHH has been working tirelessly to promote legislation mandating stiff sentences for rock throwers and those who commit vandilism on Har Hazeitim
- Raising public awareness about the serious issues confronting Har Hazeitim has been a formidable achievement of the ICPHH.
- The Israeli government and local authorities have achieved relative safety since working with the ICPHH.

ICPHH Program

- Beef up security forces
- Finish the construction of the fences, gates and walls
- Restore 23,000 graves (from Jordanian occupation)
- Construction of Visitors Education Center and shul
- Development of many new infastructure and beautification projects
